This passion led him to amass one of the most comprehensive private collections of Alamo-related artifacts in the world, totaling 432 items.

The Phil Collins Collection is now on display at the Alamo Exhibit in the Ralston Family Collections Center, where visitors can view these priceless artifacts and gain a deeper understanding of the events that unfolded at the Alamo. With 100,000 square feet of exhibit space, the museum will be able to display the full breadth of the collection, allowing visitors to explore the rich history of the Alamo in greater detail than ever before
